Tom wrenched my heart. He is a nurse and frontline hospital worker dealing with COVID-19 patients. He was interviewed on the November 1 episode of the Rachel Maddow Show. Generally, when we listen to news surrounding the pandemic, it is focused on patients and numbers. But this segment with Tom brought to the forefront that these nurses, working with so many critical patients, are also suffering and struggling mightily. He was the first nurse in his hospital to lose a patient to COVID-19, and he couldn't stop crying. Tom related how devastating the pandemic has become and that his heart is broken due to his inability to improve conditions for both the patients and nurses. As nurses, we have all learned to hide our own pain deep within ourselves to be able to care for others. We must keep in mind that these nurses need our continual love and support. The healers need healing! All of our frontline workers epitomize what service and sacrifice look like.

Celebrating and Honoring a Nurse Heroine: Faye Berzon

For Veterans Day on November 11, Hadassah profiled an extraordinary woman who is a nurse and a member of our council. At the age of 94, Faye Berzon belongs to a group of 124,000 unique women who played a significant role as members of the US Cadet Nurse Corps. Faye is one of the "unsung heroines of World War II," where she was proud to serve in the all-female Corps, the first uniformed service in the US that did not discriminate based on religion

or race

Advocacy Alert from Helene Kornstein

Our council has the opportunity to help advocate for the passage of a bill for limited Honorary Veteran status for WWII Cadet Nurses. The mission of the US Cadet Nurses Corps from 1943-1948 was to serve as nurses on the home front while preparing nurses for service in the military as needed to support the war effort. Today, these heroic nurses, including our own Faye Berzon, want to be remembered for their service to our country with a gravesite plaque and an American flag.

Senator Elizabeth Warren of MA is lead sponsor of Bill # S997: the US Cadet Nurse Corps Service Recognition Act. It provides limited honorary Veteran status for WWII Cadet Nurses. Last year it failed in the Senate. The bill number in the House Of Representatives is HR 2056. The bill, which has large bipartisan support, has 100 % support of the VFW, the ANA and 62 members of the Nursing Community Coalition. More Senate cosponsors are needed, and that is where Hadassah will assist.

Hadassah has created an action alert on the National Advocacy page where members may, with an easy click, send a letter to their members of Congress. <u>Visit the action center to add your support.</u> It is very important for Hadassah members to send letters to members of Congress to advocate on behalf of these aging WWII Cadet Nurses and give them the recognition they deserve.

From my role as president, I moved on to chair the nascent network for young women called EVOLVE Hadassah, of which I am terribly proud. Through EVOLVE, I have met the incredibly energetic and devoted young women who are proving to be the future of Hadassah. I wish them much success! Locally, I am the liaison/mentor to our young women's chapter, Neshama, in Greater Philadelphia. I believe deeply that while these young women, while respecting those of us with years of experience, understand how to cultivate the next generation of active and devoted Hadassah women. Currently, at the national level, I am chair of National Membership.

On a personal note, I'm a Jersey shore native and recently moved back to the beach in Ventnor, NJ. I have been married for 34 years to Allen, the cousin of my best friend at Brandeis University. We have three adult children. Our daughters, Jessica and Heather, are active Hadassah Life members in the NY Young Professionals chapter. That they are carrying on the Hadassah legacy is deeply gratifying to me. I am so proud! Allen and my son David are Hadassah Associates. I am of course proud of them as they actively support my passion for Hadassah and the work that we all do. I'd also like to mention that my mother, a Life Member, joined my daughters and me at the Hadassah convention in NY, and it is a Hadassah family memory I will cherish forever. I have to say that I would not be able to get through my day without my husband's partnership. I would not be able to manage all of the day-to-day tasks that keep our family going without his support.

My day starts the night before. At the end of a late night of studying, writing, research interviews, and school meetings, I pack up my computer, make school lunches, and take out clothes for the little ones. If I am in clinicals, I try to leave around 6 am before everyone gets up. This gives me time to check assignments and pull up patient lists before I head to the unit. Meanwhile, at home, my husband is getting the kids out to school.

While in clinicals, I try not to answer calls from home. It is important to give my students priority in the units. I have set clinical "care plans" with my goals and learning objectives for the day. In

the high-risk pregnancy unit, we do Leopold's maneuvers, connect fetal monitors, and interpret strips. In the maternity unit, we prepare private and group patient education sessions, do postpartum and neonatal assessments, and discharge new mothers and babies. In the nursing school, we have a very loving and supportive staff. We rely on each other to meet our goals and work well as a team.

But really, my day is just like most moms. Sometimes I just pray I will get through the day hoping all the little things will work themselves out. I pray to find a parking spot, to make it to my early class, to leave a Zoom at just the right time to

sign into the next one, which ends just in time to run to my car, speed home to put up dinner, get to a piano lesson, pick up from swim, serve dinner, give baths, and start a never-ending bedtime routine.

People tell me I do too much; how do I manage school on top of it all? I am in a very intense accelerated online three-year PhD program which most people end up doing in six. It is hard. But this part of my life is holy; it's for me. I enjoy writing and research and learning new worldviews. I love the philosophy of science. I love using my brain to digest new approaches to old nursing problems. This is one of the most meaningful parts of my life. It's more than a hobby. It brings me joy. And so, at the end of a long, long day, I close my computer, pack up my bag, make lunches and take out clothes, and prepare to do it all again. Because even if I missed something today, there is always tomorrow.

Online Program Recaps from Our Professional Councils

Medical Marijuana: Highs & Lows, Smoke & Mirrors

The speaker, Dr. Jordan Tishler, a Cannabis Specialist, was trained at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. While caring for his patients through his private practice, "InhaleMD," he also works on the faculty of both the Brigham & Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School. In his informative presentation, Dr. Tishler talked about the symptoms that can be treated by medical cannabis and explained the current research that exists in testing the use of cannabis to treat cancer and neurological illnesses. Eye Health 2020

Dr. Lynn Brandes, an Optometry Specialist in Brockton, MA, who has more than 25 years experience in her field and has also worked in Israel, focused on digital devices and eye strain. Dr. Brandes spoke about how the increase in usage of digital devices, especially during the pandemic, has become a public health issue. This has resulted in decreased social and motor skills, especially among children. She provided some tools and instruction on how both adults and children can balance the usage of digital devices. Diane Gottlieb, MSN, APRN, CNM Talks about Her Interview with Abby Friedman

In 1995, I was working at a women's health clinic as a Certified Nurse Midwife. It was right before Christmas, and I decided to hang a menorah on my office door. A few minutes later, a nurse knocked on my door and asked if I was Jewish. We chatted awhile and she asked if I would like to join a Jewish nurses' group that was meeting that week. The group was the Landy Kaplan Nurses Council Chapter of Greater Miami Hadassah. I went to the meeting, volunteered to be the Treasurer and, as they say, the rest is history and the beginning of a relationship with Hadassah that continues today.

Since then, as President of that same Nurses Council chapter, as Co-Chair of Hadassah's National Nurses Council, as a National Vice President and now, as a member of the Board of Directors of Hadassah Medical Organization, I have had the privilege and honor of meeting many nurses at Hadassah Medical Organization and at the Henrietta Szold Hadassah Hebrew University School of Nursing. Nurses speak a universal language and share a universal goal. Nursing has evolved from the care of patients in the battlefield to the scientific evidenced-based profession that it is today.

Hadassah has been committed to supporting clinical nursing and nursing education since 1918 when we established the first School of Nursing in pre-state Israel. One of the goals of the Nurses & Allied Health Professionals Council is to connect us to our Israeli colleagues so that we can see the impact that Hadassah and American nursing has had on nursing in Israel. Through the council, we share the language of healing and teaching through nursing and the goal of advancing nursing practice through research.

For a recent council online program on "Inside the Hadassah School of Nursing in Israel," I had the great pleasure of interviewing Abby Kra Friedman. Abby is an outgrowth of our council's commitment to nursing and an outstanding example of the compassion we show when caring for our patients, the passion with which we educate the next generation of nursing students, and the knowledge we gain while advancing the profession of nursing through the application of nursing science.

"Taking Action in Times of Need: Lillian Wald, the Henry Street Settlement, and the Lower East Side"

The Nurses & Allied Health Professionals Council presents this webinar on the early years of nurse Lillian Wald, her establishment of the Henry Street Settlement, its place in New York City and the nation, and its enduring fight for social justice. Henrietta Szold herself was inspired by Wald and her work when starting Hadassah. In March 1893, 26-year-old nurse Lillian Wald rushed through the gritty streets of Manhattan's Lower East Side to the bedside of a deathly ill woman. Hemorrhaging after childbirth, the woman had been abandoned by her doctor because she could not pay his fee. Wald's visit to the squalid apartment and the dismal scene she found there awakened her to the depth of poverty and inequality on the Lower East Side, and inspired her to create Henry Street Settlement: a place of healing and action.

Our speaker will be Ellen M. Snyder-Grenier, a national-award-winning curator and writer, and principal of REW & Co. She directs research projects, develops museum exhibitions, and writes on urban history, with a focus on social justice. The author of an award-winning history of Brooklyn, Snyder-Grenier is a Fellow of the New York Academy of History.
