## Meet a Member: Lisa Friedman, MSN, CPN San Antonio, TX

"I have worked in some aspect of nursing for 25 years. I began my nursing career after graduating from the University of New Hampshire, when I was commissioned into the US Air Force as an RN and was stationed at Travis AFB in California. I then moved to the Pediatric ICU at Wilford Hall Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas. It was here that I discovered that pediatrics was the field for me. While finishing up 8 years on active duty, I met and married my husband, earned my MSN and settled into the role of Pediatric Nurse Practitioner.

This past winter, through a partnership between Hadassah and Momentum, I had the honor and pleasure of leading a group of San Antonio women on a journey to Israel where we met Jewish mothers from around the globe and

developed a special bond with Hadassah members from California and Florida. This opportunity of a lifetime was given to nine other applicants from the Aviva group of Hadassah, who are now in turn giving back to the local community through outreach and other educational programs. The women on this trip visited many important historical locations in Israel, were inspired by dynamic trip leaders and were fortunate to visit Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO) and Meir Shfeya's Youth Village. Unbelievably, one of my fellow Hadassah leaders was a long lost friend from my Hebrew school days. It feels like yesterday when we were Bat Mitzvah candidates watching our own mothers as Hadassah members. Nearly 35 years later, we are active Hadassah members and planning B'nai Mitzvot for our own children!"



# Ask an HMO Nurse: "Which is your favorite specialty?"

"In thinking about my professional life, I realized that in every role I have played, I've loved something unique to that particular role. As a nurse in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, I have always been excited by the wonderful ability of children to recover from extremely difficult situations. I also tried to think of the parents: 'What do they need right now? What can I do for them in these difficult moments?' As a nurse in the Pediatric

Ambulatory Care Unit and in charge of the Pediatric AIDS Center, I put emphasis on accepting those who are different and the importance of not judging.

One of my significant experiences was as Head Nurse of the Department & Day Care for Bone Marrow Transplantation and Cancer Immunotherapy. While as a staff nurse, my care was fully directed to patients and families, and then as a head nurse, I conveyed those values to the amazing team I led for 8 years. As the team leader, I saw my main role as being responsible for the well-being of the team, both professionally and personally, so that they had the motivation, skills, abilities and values to give of themselves to others.

As a Nurse Director of the Hemato-oncology and ER Division, I saw my primary purpose in nurturing excellent head nurses who would then, in turn, foster excellent nurses themselves. I have invested in growing a leadership generation who knows how to best integrate first-class professionalism with compassion and soul.

For the past two years, as the Director of Nursing at Hadassah Hospital Mount Scopus, I have had a great responsibility. First and foremost, I ensure quality and safe care for our patients, who trust us and put their lives into our hands.

All of my experiences have combined professional duties, fascinating encounters with people, and learning and development. They all connect to my love for people, both patients and staff, a deep satisfaction in giving to others who are in difficult life situations, and the immense significance and value in the work of a nurse.

Thank you for the privilege you have given to me to review my professional life, especially during this challenging and complex time. I love my profession and am more than ever, proud to be a nurse!

#### **All About Achotenu**

Achotenu is a revolutionary academic nurses training program. In 2014, Achotenu (which means both 'my nurse' and 'my sister' in Hebrew), reached out to Hadassah, sharing that many Ethiopian immigrants aspired to be nurses but needed academic and financial support. It was through the very generous bequest of Patricia Lapan (of blessed memory), a Jewish Zionist American nurse and philanthropist, as well as with the most recent support of Hadassah International Australia, that Hadassah once again was able to meet the needs of a special population, while simultaneously addressing the nursing shortage in Israel.

### Webinar Recap: Science and Social Justice

Paula Apsell, Hadassah member and the winner of a Lifetime Achievement Emmy for her role as senior executive producer for PBS's acclaimed NOVA series, was the speaker on a recently held professional councils' webinar. This program, titled "Understanding the Role of Science in Promoting Social Justice and Improving our Lives," was held on July 28.

Paula was interviewed by Lisa Hostein, Executive Editor of *Hadassah Magazine*. Paula explained how science plays an integral role in promoting social justice. She

showed a short clip about the water crisis in Flint, Michigan, as an example of citizen science making a difference as the residents gathered data on their own. Paula also shared a preview of a NOVA episode that documents how scientists discovered escape tunnels created by Jews during the Holocaust in Luthuania.

Paula spoke at length about women in technology, and particularly the importance of encouraging girls and young women to pursue careers in STEM, providing examples from her personal and professional life. She also referred to the disparity in hiring minorities in the workplace and how best to solve this problem. Throughout this webinar, Paula emphasized how science can provide practical solutions to some of the world's most persisting problems, such as global warming.


# **Podcast Update: The Branch**

#### Amazing Tales of a Nurse Crusader

Hadassah New York Nurses Council's Zoom meeting on July 12 featuring the extraordinary Cynthia Wachtell, PhD. It was titled "Amazing Tales from a Nurse Crusader." The talk featured the stories of an amazing nurse and writer: the little-known Ellen N. LaMotte.

Dr. Wachtell had us spellbound as she described the numerous battles LaMotte fought, starting with her enrollment in the Johns Hopkins School of

Nursing in 1898 against her family's objections. She traveled abroad to be a suffragette. She volunteered during WWI in France at an Army field hospital and reported on the ethical dilemmas in the ward, becoming a prominent and widely published anti-war journalist. She emerged as a public health leader in the TB crisis in Baltimore, trying to promote quarantining over general precautions. She was a vocal activist against police brutality, and she also predicted and tried to prevent the opium crisis coming from the Far East. Her experiences greatly resonate with our present day.

Dr. Wachtell is currently the Research Professor of American Studies at Yeshiva University. She discovered the anti-war activities and writings of LaMotte while she was pursuing graduate studies at Yale, researching WWI anti-war activities. Her work came to the attention of our Lillian Wald chapter through a *New York Times* <u>op-ed</u>. View the presentation <u>here</u> (starting at the 12-minute mark; use passcode 9E\$v6pCw.)



## Local Council News

The Nurses Council of Canadian Hadassah-WIZO (now referred to as CHW) was formed in 1995 under the guidance and support of Nancy Falchuk, the 24th Hadassah National President and co-founder of the Hadassah National Center for Nurses Councils. An outreach was forwarded to all Jewish nurses in the province of Quebec inviting them to attend a Hadassah International reception that was held at the Ritz Carlton Hotel in Montreal, Quebec. A positive response was immediate. For the most part, the nurses were graduates of the Jewish General Hospital School of Nursing.

The rest is history. Over the years, this group has met

consistently through programing and fundraising activities. The original mission of the group was to raise money to support the Nursing Department at the Assaf Harofeh Hospital (now called Shamir Medical Centre), a satellite of the Hadassah Henrietta Szold Hebrew University School of Nursing), in the form of scholarships for students to pursue their studies in nursing. Currently, the funds raised by the group support the overall budget of CHW. Our programs currently focus on providing community health forums, addressing a wide range of health-related issues including memory disorders, bone and joint ailments, palliative care and end-of-life decisions. Our most recent forum was on medical cannabis and was well-attended, met with appreciation, enthusiasm and many questions.

To this day we remain the only Hadassah Nurses Council in Canada. Although most of us are now retired, our primary focus remains on health issues facing communities today. We are very proud of our work and, in addition to the fundraising we have accomplished, we have become a close-knit group of friends.
